#### REPORT OF INDEPENDENT AUDITORS

#### **Report on Audit of the Financial Statements**

#### **Opinion**

We have audited the financial statements of the governmental activities and each major fund of Southern Hills Plantation I Community Development District (the "District"), as of and for the year ended September 30, 2023, and the related notes to financial statements, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities and each major fund of Southern Hills Plantation I Community Development District as of September 30, 2023, and the respective changes in financial position and the budgetary comparison for the General Fund for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

#### Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS), and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the District and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

#### Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the District's ability to continue as a going concern for one year beyond the financial statement date, including currently known information that may raise substantial doubt thereafter.

#### Auditor's Responsibility for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore, is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS and *Government Auditing Standards* will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS and Government Auditing Standards, we:

- Exercise professional judgement and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether
  due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks.
   Such procedures include examining on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and
  disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit
  procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of
  expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control. Accordingly,
  no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgement, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the District's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control related matters that we identified during the audit.

#### Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that Management's Discussion and Analysis be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the *Governmental Accounting Standards Board* who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

#### Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued a report dated July 3, 2024 on our consideration of the District's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations and contracts.

The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering Southern Hills Plantation I Community Development District's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

Management's discussion and analysis of Southern Hills Plantation I Community Development District (the "District") financial performance provides an objective and easily readable analysis of the District's financial activities. The analysis provides summary financial information for the District and should be read in conjunction with the District's financial statements.

#### **OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

The District's basic financial statements comprise three components; 1) Government-wide financial statements, 2) Fund financial statements, and 3) Notes to financial statements. The Government-wide financial statements present an overall picture of the District's financial position and results of operations. The Fund financial statements present financial information for the District's major funds. The Notes to financial statements provide additional information concerning the District's finances.

The Government-wide financial statements are the **statement of net position** and the **statement of activities**. These statements use accounting methods similar to those used by private-sector companies. Emphasis is placed on the net position of governmental activities and the change in net position. Governmental activities are primarily supported by special assessments.

The **statement of net position** presents information on all assets and liabilities of the District, with the difference between assets and liabilities reported as net position. Net position is reported in three categories; 1) net investment in capital assets, 2) restricted, and 3) unrestricted. Assets, liabilities, and net position are reported for all Governmental activities.

The **statement of activities** presents information on all revenues and expenses of the District and the change in net position. Expenses are reported by major function and program revenues relating to those functions are reported, providing the net cost of all functions provided by the District. To assist in understanding the District's operations, expenses have been reported as governmental activities. Governmental activities financed by the District include general government, physical environment and debt service.

Fund financial statements present financial information for governmental funds. These statements provide financial information for the major funds of the District. Governmental fund financial statements provide information on the current assets and liabilities of the funds, changes in current financial resources (revenues and expenditures), and current available resources.

#### OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED)

Fund financial statements include a balance sheet and a statement of revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balances for all governmental funds. A statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances – budget and actual is provided for the District's General Fund. Fund financial statements provide more detailed information about the District's activities. Individual funds are established by the District to track revenues that are restricted to certain uses or to comply with legal requirements.

The government-wide financial statements and the fund financial statements provide different pictures of the District. The government-wide financial statements provide an overall picture of the District's financial standing. These statements are comparable to private-sector companies and give a good understanding of the District's overall financial health and how the District paid for the various activities, or functions, provided by the District. All assets of the District, including capital assets are reported in the **statement of net position**. All liabilities, including principal outstanding on bonds are included. The **statement of activities** includes depreciation on all long-lived assets of the District, but transactions between the different functions of the District have been eliminated in order to avoid "doubling up" the revenues and expenses. The fund financial statements provide a picture of the major funds of the District. In the case of governmental activities, outlays for long lived assets are reported as expenditures and long-term liabilities, such as general obligation bonds, are not included in the fund financial statements. To provide a link from the fund financial statements to the government-wide financial statements, reconciliations are provided from the fund financial statements to the government-wide financial statements.

Notes to financial statements provide additional detail concerning the financial activities and financial balances of the District. Additional information about the accounting practices of the District, investments of the District, capital assets and long-term debt are some of the items included in the *notes to financial statements*.

#### **Financial Highlights**

The following are the highlights of financial activity for the year ended September 30, 2023.

- ◆ The District's total assets exceeded total liabilities by \$4,291,343 (net position). Net investment in capital assets for the District was \$5,067,265. Unrestricted net position for Governmental Activities was (\$1,554,852). Restricted net position was \$778,930.
- ♦ Governmental activities revenues totaled \$1,541,894 while governmental activities expenses totaled \$1,894,359.

The increase in current assets is related to the increase in due from developer in the current year.

The decrease in capital assets is due to depreciation in the current year.

The decrease in current liabilities is related to the decrease in accounts payable and matured bonds payable in the current year.

The decrease in non-current liabilities is primarily related to current year principal payments.

The decrease in net investment in capital assets is primarily due to depreciation in excess of principal payments on long-term debt in the current year.

The decrease in charges for services is related to a budgeted decrease in special assessments in the current year.

The increase in intergovernmental revenues is related to the cost sharing agreements with other governmental entities.

The decrease in general government is related to the decrease in legal fees and the write-off of certain due from other government amounts in the prior year.

The increase in physical environment is mainly related to the increase in landscape and irrigation maintenance and pond repair and maintenance in the current year.

#### **General Fund Budgetary Highlights**

The September 30, 2023 budget was amended for settlement costs not originally anticipated.

Budgeted expenditures exceeded actual expenditures because contingency expenditures were less than anticipated.

#### **Debt Management**

Governmental Activities debt includes the following:

♦ In March 2011, the District issued \$7,010,000 Series 2011 A-1 and \$5,095,000 Series 2011 A-2 Capital Improvement Revenue Bonds. These bonds were issued to finance and refinance the acquisition and construction of certain infrastructure improvements within the District. The District did not make the current year principal payment and it is reflected as matured bonds payable, \$540,000, in the financial statements. The unmatured balance outstanding at September 30, 2023 was \$7,935,000.

#### OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED)

#### **Economic Factors and Next Year's Budget**

The District does not anticipate any major projects or significant changes to its infrastructure maintenance program for the subsequent fiscal year. In addition, it is anticipated that the general operations of the District will remain fairly constant.

#### NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements of the District have been prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) as applied to governmental units. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The District's more significant accounting policies are described below.

#### 1. Reporting Entity

The District was established on August 2, 2004, pursuant to the Uniform Community Development District Act of 1980, Chapter 190, Florida Statutes, as amended (the "Act"), by Ordinance #676 of the City of Brooksville, Florida, as a Community Development District. The District was established for the purposes of financing and managing the acquisition, construction, maintenance and operation of the infrastructure necessary for community development within its jurisdiction. The District is authorized to issue bonds for the purpose, among others, of financing, funding, planning, establishing, acquiring, constructing district roads, landscaping, and other basic infrastructure projects within or outside the boundaries of the Southern Hills Plantation I Community Development District. The District is governed by a Board of Supervisors who are elected to four-year terms. The District operates within the criteria established by Chapter 190, Florida Statutes.

As required by GAAP, these financial statements present the Southern Hills Plantation I Community Development District (the primary government) as a stand-alone government. The reporting entity for the District includes all functions of government in which the District's Board exercises oversight responsibility including, but not limited to, financial interdependency, selection of governing authority, designation of management, significant ability to influence operations and accountability for fiscal matters.

Based upon the application of the above-mentioned criteria as set forth in Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement Number 61, The Financial Reporting Entity, the District has identified no component units.

#### 2. Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting

The basic financial statements of the District are composed of the following:

- Government-wide financial statements
- Fund financial statements
- Notes to financial statements

#### NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

#### 2. Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting (Continued)

#### a. Government-wide Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Government-wide financial statements report all non-fiduciary information about the reporting government as a whole. These statements include all the governmental activities of the primary government. The effect of interfund activity has been removed from these statements.

Governmental activities are supported by special assessments and interest. Program revenues are netted with program expenses in the statement of activities to present the net cost of each program

Amounts paid to acquire capital assets are capitalized as assets, rather than reported as an expenditure. Proceeds of long-term debt are recorded as liabilities in the government-wide financial statements, rather than as an other financing source.

Amounts paid to reduce long-term indebtedness of the reporting government are reported as a reduction of the related liability, rather than as an expenditure.

#### b. Fund Financial Statements

The underlying accounting system of the District is organized and operated on the basis of separate funds, each of which is considered to be a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues and expenditures or expenses, as appropriate. Governmental resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based upon the purposes for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled.

Fund financial statements for the primary government's governmental funds are presented after the government-wide financial statements. These statements display information about major funds individually.

#### NOTE A – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

#### 2. Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting (Continued)

#### b. Fund Financial Statements (Continued)

#### **Governmental Funds**

The District classifies fund balance according to Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement 54 – Fund Balance Reporting and Governmental Fund Type Definitions. The Statement requires the fund balance for governmental funds to be reported in classifications that comprise a hierarchy based primarily on the extent to which the government is bound to honor constraints on the specific purposes for which amounts in those funds can be spent.

The District has various policies governing the fund balance classifications.

Nonspendable Fund Balance – This classification consists of amounts that cannot be spent because they are either not in spendable form or are legally or contractually required to be maintained intact.

Restricted Fund Balance – This classification includes amounts that can be spent only for specific purposes stipulated by constitution, external resource providers, or through enabling legislation.

Assigned Fund Balance – This classification consists of the Board of Supervisors' intent to be used for specific purposes, but are neither restricted nor committed. The assigned fund balances can also be assigned by the District's management company.

Unassigned Fund Balance – This classification is the residual classification for the government's general fund and includes all spendable amounts not contained in the other classifications. Unassigned fund balance is considered to be utilized first when an expenditure is incurred for purposes for which amounts in any of those unrestricted fund balance classifications could be used.

Fund Balance Spending Hierarchy – For all governmental funds except special revenue funds, when restricted, committed, assigned, and unassigned fund balances are combined in a fund, qualified expenditures are paid first from restricted or committed fund balance, as appropriate, then assigned and finally unassigned fund balances.

#### NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

#### 2. Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting (Continued)

#### b. Fund Financial Statements (Continued)

#### **Governmental Funds (Continued)**

Governmental fund financial statements are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are considered to be available when they are collected within the current period or soon thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period. For this purpose, the District considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 90 days of the end of the current fiscal period.

Expenditures generally are recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting. Interest associated with the current fiscal period is considered to be an accrual item and so has been recognized as revenue of the current fiscal period.

Under the current financial resources measurement focus, only current assets and current liabilities are generally included on the balance sheet. The reported fund balance is considered to be a measure of "available spendable resources". Governmental fund operating statements present increases (revenues and other financing sources) and decreases (expenditures and other financing uses) in net current assets. Accordingly, they are said to present a summary of sources and uses of "available spendable resources" during a period.

Because of their spending measurement focus, expenditure recognition for governmental fund types excludes amounts represented by non-current liabilities. Since they do not affect net current assets, such long-term amounts are not recognized as governmental fund type expenditures or fund liabilities.

Amounts expended to acquire capital assets are recorded as expenditures in the year that resources are expended, rather than as fund assets. The proceeds of long-term debt are recorded as an other financing source rather than as a fund liability.

Debt service expenditures are recorded only when payment is due.

#### 3. Basis of Presentation

#### a. Governmental Major Funds

<u>General Fund</u> – The General Fund is the District's primary operating fund. It accounts for all financial resources of the general government, except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

#### NOTE A – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

#### 3. Basis of Presentation (Continued)

#### a. Governmental Major Funds (Continued)

<u>Debt Service Fund</u> – Accounts for debt service requirements to retire the special assessment bonds which were used to finance the construction of District infrastructure improvements. The bonds are secured by a first lien on and pledge of the Pledged Revenues.

#### b. Non-current Governmental Assets/Liabilities

GASB Statement 34 requires that non-current governmental assets, such as land and improvements, and non-current governmental liabilities, such as general obligation bonds and due to developer be reported in the governmental activities column in the government-wide Statement of Net Position.

#### 4. Assets, Liabilities, Deferred Inflows of Resources and Net Position or Equity

#### a. Cash and Investments

Florida Statutes require state and local governmental units to deposit monies with financial institutions classified as "Qualified Public Depositories," a multiple financial institution pool whereby groups of securities pledged by the various financial institutions provide common collateral from their deposits of public funds. This pool is provided as additional insurance to the federal depository insurance and allows for additional assessments against the member institutions, providing full insurance for public deposits.

The District is authorized to invest in those financial instruments as established by Section 218.415, Florida Statutes. The authorized investments consist of:

- 1. Direct obligations of the United States Treasury;
- 2. The Local Government Surplus Funds Trust or any intergovernmental investment pool authorized pursuant to the Florida Interlocal Cooperative Act of 1969;
- 3. Interest-bearing time deposits or savings accounts in authorized qualified public depositories;
- 4. Securities and Exchange Commission, registered money market funds with the highest credit quality rating from a nationally recognized rating agency.

#### NOTE A – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

#### 4. Assets, Liabilities, Deferred Inflows of Resources and Net Position or Equity (Continued)

#### a. Cash and Investments (Continued)

Cash equivalents include time deposits and all highly liquid debt instruments with original maturities of three months or less and held in a qualified public depository as defined by Section 280.02, Florida Statutes.

#### b. Restricted Assets

Certain net position of the District is classified as restricted assets on the statement of net position because their use is limited either by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation; or by restrictions imposed externally by creditors. In a fund with both restricted and unrestricted assets, qualified expenses are considered to be paid first from restricted net position and then from unrestricted net position.

#### c. Capital Assets

Capital assets, which include land and improvements, infrastructure, improvements other than buildings and equipment are reported in the governmental activities column.

The District defines capital assets as assets with an initial, individual cost of \$5,000 or more and an estimated useful life in excess of one year. The valuation basis for all assets is historical cost.

The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend its useful life are not capitalized.

Major outlays for capital assets and improvements are capitalized as projects are constructed.

Depreciation of capital assets is computed and recorded by utilizing the straight-line method. Estimated useful lives of the various classes of depreciable capital assets range from 15 to 25 years.

#### d. Deferred Inflows of Resources

Deferred inflows of resources represent an acquisition of net position that applies to a future reporting period(s) and so will not be recognized as an inflow of resources (revenue) until then. The District only has one item that qualifies for reporting in this category. Deferred revenues are reported only in the governmental funds balance sheet. This amount is deferred and recognized as an inflow of resources in the period that amounts become available.

#### NOTE A – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

#### 4. Assets, Liabilities, Deferred Inflows of Inflows and Net Position or Equity (Continued)

#### e. Budgets

Budgets are prepared and adopted after public hearings for the governmental funds, pursuant to Chapter 190, Florida Statutes. The District utilizes the same basis of accounting for budgets as it does for revenues and expenditures in its various funds. The legal level of budgetary control is at the fund level. All budgeted appropriations lapse at year end. Formal budgets are adopted for the general and debt service funds. As a result, deficits in the budget columns of the accompanying financial statements may occur.

#### **NOTE B - CASH AND INVESTMENTS**

All deposits are held in qualified public depositories and are included on the accompanying balance sheet as cash and investments.

#### **Custodial Credit Risk**

Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the District's deposits may not be returned to it. The District does not have a formal deposit policy for custodial credit risk; however, they follow the provisions of Chapter 280, Florida Statutes regarding deposits and investments. As of September 30, 2023, the District's bank balance was \$724,952 and the carrying value was \$724,132. Exposure to custodial credit risk was as follows. The District maintains all deposits in a qualified public depository in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 280, Florida Statutes, which means that all deposits are fully insured by Federal Depositors Insurance or collateralized under Chapter 280, Florida Statutes.

The District categorizes its fair value measurements within the fair value hierarchy recently established by generally accepted accounting principles. The fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset, or paid to transfer a liability, in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The hierarchy is based on the valuation inputs used to measure the fair value of the asset. The District uses a market approach in measuring fair value that uses prices and other relevant information generated by market transactions involving identical or similar assets, liabilities, or groups of assets and liabilities.

#### NOTE B - CASH AND INVESTMENTS (CONTINUED)

#### <u>Investments</u> (Continued)

Assets or liabilities are classified into one of three levels. Level 1 is the most reliable and is based on quoted prices for identical assets, or liabilities, in an active market. Level 2 uses significant other observable inputs when obtaining quoted prices for identical or similar assets, or liabilities, in markets that are not active. Level 3 is the least reliable and uses significant unobservable inputs that use the best information available under the circumstances, which includes the District's own data in measuring unobservable inputs.

Based on the criteria in the preceding paragraph, the investment in First American Treasury Obligation Fund is a Level 1 asset.

The District's investment policy allows management to invest funds in investments permitted under Section 218.415, Florida Statutes. The investment in Florida PRIME is measured at amortized cost. Florida PRIME has established policies and guidelines regarding participant transactions and the authority to limit or restrict withdrawals or impose a penalty for an early withdrawal. As of September 30, 2023, there were no redemption fees, maximum transaction amounts, or any other requirements that would limit daily access to 100 percent of the account value.

#### Interest Rate Risk

The District does not have a formal investment policy that limits investment maturities as a means of managing its exposure to fair value losses arising from increasing interest rates.

#### Credit Risk

The District's investments are limited by state statutory requirements and bond compliance. The District has no investment policy that would further limit its investment choices. As of September 30, 2023, the District's investments in First American Treasury Obligation Fund were rated AAAm by Standard & Poor's. As of September 30, 2023, the District's investment in Florida PRIME was rated AAAm by Standard & Poor's.

#### Concentration of Credit Risk

The District places no limit on the amount it may invest in any one fund. The investments in the Florida PRIME are less than 1% of the District's total investments. The investments in First American Treasury Obligation Fund are nearly 100% of the District's total investments.

The types of deposits and investments and their level of risk exposure as of September 30, 2023 were typical of these items during the fiscal year then ended. The District considers any decline in fair value for certain investments to be temporary.

#### **NOTE C - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS**

Three of the voting members of the Board of Supervisors are employed by the Developer or a related entity. The District has \$1,142,616 in due from developer, net any doubtful accounts, from the Developer and other related parties from prior and current years that have not been collected.

The District entered into an Inter-local Agreement, dated December 28, 2004 with Southern Hills Plantation II Community Development District ("SH2") and Southern Hills Plantation III Community Development District ("SH3"). Under the agreement, the District was designated to supervise and manage the construction and maintenance of improvements in all three districts, and SH2 and SH3 would share those costs. Both SH2 and SH3 failed to fulfill the payment obligations under the Interlocal Agreement. In the current fiscal year, SH1 and SH3 entered into a repayment agreement and SH3 has made up its outstanding amounts due under the Interlocal Agreement.

In May 2023, the District entered into an Inter-local Agreement with SH2 and SH3 establishing cost sharing provisions moving forward and a settlement amount for SH2 for amounts past due for fiscal years prior to fiscal year 2023. Under the terms of the agreement, SH2 will pay SH1 an initial sum of \$40,000 due January 31, 2024, and a fixed annual amount of \$20,000 through fiscal year 2026 due annually by April 1. Commencing in fiscal year 2026, SH2 will pay 25 percent of the annual cost of maintenance of the improvements, and commencing in fiscal year 2023, SH3 will pay 23.8 percent of the annual cost.

The amount receivable, net any doubtful accounts, from the two Districts at September 30, 2023 was \$67,378.

#### Significant Bond Provisions

The Series 2011A-1 and A-2 Bonds are subject to redemption at the option of the District prior to their maturity, in whole or in part, at any time after May 1, 2012, at a redemption price set in the Bond indenture. The Bonds are subject to extraordinary mandatory redemption prior to maturity in the manner determined by the Bond Registrar if certain events occurred as outlined in the Bond indenture.

The Bond Indenture established certain amounts be maintained in a reserve account. The District agrees to levy special assessments in annual amounts adequate to provide payment of debt service and to meet the reserve requirements.

#### **Depository Funds**

The bond resolution establishes certain funds and determines the order in which revenues are to be deposited into these funds. A description of the significant funds, including their purposes, is as follows:

<u>Reserve Fund</u> – The Series 2011 Reserve Account is funded from the proceeds of the Bonds. Monies held in the reserve accounts will be used only for the purposes established in the Trust Indenture.

The District made a principal payment on the previously matured bonds payable for the Series 2011A-1 Bonds in the amount of \$240,000. The District did not make the May 2023 required principal payment for the Series 2011A-2 in the amount of \$190,000, bringing total matured bonds payable for the Series 2011A-2 Bonds to \$540,000 as of September 30, 2023. These amounts are reflected as matured bonds payable in the accompanying financial statements.

#### **NOTE F - RISK MANAGEMENT**

The District is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; and natural disasters for which the government carries commercial insurance. The District has not filed any claims under this commercial coverage during the last three years.

#### NOTE G - ESCHEATED PROPERTY AND BOND WRITE DOWN

The District contends that certain Series 2011A-1 Bonds should be written down by the portion of the debt that is attributable to certain lots that escheated to Hernando County, Florida ("County"). The District has contacted the Bond Trustee about the write-off of principal of \$445,000; however, the Bond Trustee has not yet responded that a write-off is appropriate. The dates the 48 parcels escheated to the County, are as follows:

#### Report on Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered Southern Hills Plantation I Community Development District's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Southern Hills Plantation I Community Development District's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of Southern Hills Plantation I Community Development District's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses or significant deficiencies may exist that have not been identified.



#### **Report on Compliance and Other Matters**

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether Southern Hills Plantation I Community Development District's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

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#### MANAGEMENT LETTER

#### **Report on the Financial Statements**

We have audited the financial statements of the Southern Hills Plantation I Community Development District as of and for the year ended September 30, 2023, and have issued our report thereon dated July 3, 2024.

#### **Auditor's Responsibility**

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States; the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States and Chapter 10.550, Rules of the Florida Auditor General.

#### Other Reporting Requirements

We have issued our Independent Auditor's Report on Internal Control over Financial Reporting and on Compliance and Other Matters Based on an Audit of Financial Statements Performed in Accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* and our Independent Auditor's Report on an examination conducted in accordance with AICPA Professionals Standards, AT-C Section 315 regarding compliance requirements in accordance with Chapter 10.550, Rules of the Auditor General. Disclosures in that report, which is dated July 3, 2024, should be considered in conjunction with this management letter.

#### **Prior Audit Findings**

Section 10.554(1)(i)1., Rules of the Auditor General, requires that we determine whether or not corrective actions have been made to address findings and recommendations made in the preceding financial audit report. The following findings or recommendations were made in the preceding financial audit report.



#### **Finding 2018-01**

**Finding:** The reserve fund was utilized to make part of the May 2018 payment due on the Series 2011 A-1 bonds. The balance had not been restored to the reserve fund by year end. We recommend that the District, in conjunction with the Trustee and the Bondholders, take steps to restore the reserve fund balance to the required amount.

**Response:** The above parties are investigating possible steps to restore the reserve balance to the required amount and/or reduce the required reserve balance.

**Status:** The reserve balance has not been restored to the required balance.

#### **Finding 21-01**

**Finding:** The Developer did not pay the 2022 debt service assessment and the May 2022, principal payment was not made.

**Response:** Certain principal payments on the Series 2011A-2 Bonds remain unpaid. The District is currently exploring all available remedies to receive the debt service assessment.

**Current Status:** During the year, the District did not make the scheduled May 2023 principal payment on the Series 2011A-2 Bonds; however, subsequent to year-end, in May 2024, the District made regular principal payments on the Series 2011A-2 Bonds. Certain principal payments on the Series 2011A-2 Bonds still remain unpaid.

#### **Financial Condition and Management**

Section 10.554(1)(i)5.a. and 10.556(7), Rules of the Auditor General, requires us to apply appropriate procedures and communicate the results of our determination as to whether or not Southern Hills Plantation I Community Development District has met one or more of the conditions described in Section 218.503(1), Florida Statutes, and to identify the specific conditions met. In connection with our audit, we determined that the Southern Hills Plantation I Community Development District did not meet any of the conditions described in Section 218.503(1), Florida Statutes.

Pursuant to Sections 10.554(1)(i)5.b. and 10.556(8), Rules of the Auditor General, we applied financial conditions assessment procedures as of September 30, 2023 for the Southern Hills Plantation I Community Development District. It is management's responsibility to monitor the Southern Hills Plantation I Community Development District's financial condition; our financial condition assessment was based in part on the representations made by management and the review of the financial information provided by the same.

Section 10.554(1)(i)2., Rules of the Auditor General, requires that we communicate any recommendations to improve financial management. In connection with our audit, we did not have any such recommendations.



#### **Specific Information**

The information provided below was provided by management and has not been audited; therefore, we do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information.

As required by Section 218.39(3)(c), Florida Statutes, and Section 10.554(1)(i)6, Rules of the Auditor General, the Southern Hills Plantation I Community Development District reported:

#### **MANAGEMENT SUMMARY**













With the increased rainfall, the water levels of Southern Hills CDD retention ponds have raised. Increased rainfall and water levels can aid in improved aesthetics of the ponds as fresh rainwater pushes out stagnant water into wetlands. A continued occurrence to be mindful of is the compounds that runoff water entering the ponds contains: fertilizers and organic debris. These are primarily composed of nitrogen and phosphorus, both nutrients that largely contribute to algal growth, and their influx can provide the needed ingredients for a bloom. In periods between rains, hot daytime temperatures and high humidity continue, treating a perfect storm for rapid algae takeover.

Full spectrum Copper Sulfate treatments continue to combat these seasonal algal blooms, and have most likely prevented the worst of them. In ponds whose construction lends to backflow and high nutrient retention, or those adjacent to greenery, this will be a constant battle against the algal growth until fresh rains once again bring relief, or until we see a reduction in growth rates during the onset of Fall, where many nutrients will have time to settle on the bottom and get locked away.

On this visit, nearly each pond visited had a unique condition, all with separate solutions. Some corrective action, like L-8AA's Duckweed or L-8CC's Hydrilla showcased rapid/immediate improvement on this inspection. Others, such as L-5II take longer for results to show. Growth between treatment events is quickest at this time of year. As the season progresses, temperatures will lower and less daylight hours will allow technicians to make more headway on the ponds. With high rain volumes it is more common for debris items to wash into the ponds, and so technicians are on alert.

#### **RECOMMENDATIONS**

Continue to treat ponds for algae, administer follow-ups to ponds experiencing extended decay times.

Administer treatments to any nuisance grasses growing along exposed shorelines and within beneficial plants.

Continue to apply treatment to overgrown littoral areas.

Avoid over treating ponds, to prevent fish kills or toxic blooms.

Stay alert for debris items that find their way to the pond's shore.

#### **Management Summary**

It is abundantly clear that Southern Hills Plantation CDD has a significant algae issue. The provided water quality testing results taken by the current vendor indicate a significant nutrient issue, which did show some improvement after some nutrient remediation steps were taken. However, they were still quite high, possibly leading to recurring algae issues.

During my inspection, one thing that stuck out to me was that there was no sign of recent treatment of any algae or submerged vegetation. The shoreline weeds were in pretty good shape overall, leading me to believe that the current vendor is mainly only spraying the grasses and making little effort to treat the algae or submerged vegetation. In some lakes, the submersed vegetation is quite severe. While nutrients will allow algae to bloom and spread rapidly, the volume of submersed vegetation in some lakes has been growing uncontrolled for quite some time.

Our primary focus would be to immediately eliminate the submersed weed issues by utilizing a combination of SONAR aquatic herbicide and other contact control methods. Simultaneously, we would begin to aggressively treat all of the algae to greatly reduce the volume of algae on every lake. Once we are able to accomplish that and determine the level of regrowth, we can make additional recommendations for the board's consideration on steps they may want to consider that would be outside of the normal maintenance contract. Some examples may be bottom-diffused aeration, beneficial bacteria, lake dye, etc.

I am confident that Premier Lakes will provide a significant improvement to the CDD's ponds. We greatly appreciate the opportunity.

- General Conditions: Premier Lakes will provide the contract services enumerated below to the Customer under the terms and conditions of this Agreement, and the Customer agrees to pay Premier Lakes for those services as listed below under the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
- 2. Service Area: The "Service Area" is described as 18 Lakes (Map Attached) consisting of approximately 34,750 linear feet and 64.75 acres.
- 3. **Contract Services:** Premier Lakes will perform **(36) thirty-six** inspections per year of the Service Area and provide the following service as necessary.
  - **a.** Aquatic Weed Control: Growth of undesired aquatic vegetation will be treated upon identification by applying aquatic herbicides and adjuvants. Most of the time, these treatments will occur immediately upon inspection. However, timing may be adjusted to ensure the best results. All efforts will be made to ensure that unwanted vegetation is controlled before it becomes unsightly.
  - **b.** Algae Control: Algae will be controlled by applying algaecides and adjuvants as needed.
  - c. Perimeter Shoreline Weed Control (Interal Littoral Shelves not included):
    Any growth of undesirable vegetation will be controlled and maintained

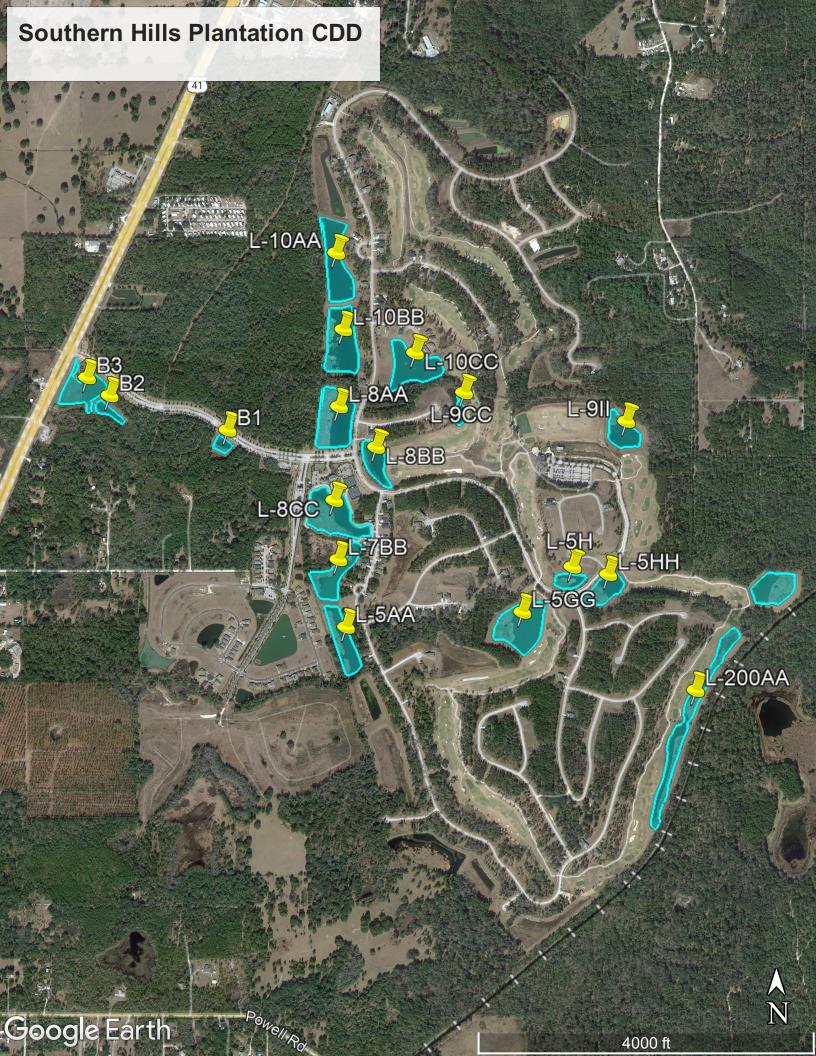

THE ANNUAL APPROPRIATION RESOLUTION OF THE SOUTHERN HILLS PLANTATION I COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT ("DISTRICT") RELATING TO THE ANNUAL APPROPRIATIONS AND ADOPTING THE BUDGET FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING OCTOBER 1, 2024 AND ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 2025; AUTHORIZING BUDGET AMENDMENTS; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the District Manager has, prior to the fifteenth (15<sup>th</sup>) day in June, 2024, submitted to the Board of Supervisors ("Board") of the Southern Hills Plantation I Community Development District ("District") a proposed budget ("Proposed Budget") for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2024 and ending September 30, 2025 ("Fiscal Year 2024/2025") along with an explanatory and complete financial plan for each fund of the District, pursuant to the provisions of Section 190.008(2)(a), Florida Statutes; and

WHEREAS, at least sixty (60) days prior to the adoption of the Proposed Budget, the District filed a copy of the Proposed Budget with the local governing authorities having jurisdiction over the area included in the District pursuant to the provisions of Section 190.008(2)(b), Florida Statutes; and

**WHEREAS**, the Board set a public hearing thereon and caused notice of such public hearing to be given by publication pursuant to Section 190.008(2)(a), *Florida Statutes*; and

**WHEREAS**, the District Manager posted the Proposed Budget on the District's website at least two days before the public hearing; and

WHEREAS, Section 190.008(2)(a), Florida Statutes, requires that, prior to October 1<sup>st</sup> of each year, the Board, by passage of the Annual Appropriation Resolution, shall adopt a budget for the ensuing fiscal year and appropriate such sums of money as the Board deems necessary to defray all expenditures of the District during the ensuing fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, the District Manager has prepared a Proposed Budget, whereby the budget shall project the cash receipts and disbursements anticipated during a given time period, including reserves for contingencies for emergency or other unanticipated expenditures during the fiscal year.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE SOUTHERN HILLS PLANTATION I COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT:

#### SECTION 1. BUDGET

a. The Board has reviewed the Proposed Budget, a copy of which is on file with the office of the District Manager and at the District's Local Records Office, and hereby approves certain amendments thereto, as shown in Section 2 below.

- b. The Proposed Budget, attached hereto as **Exhibit "A,"** as amended by the Board, is hereby adopted in accordance with the provisions of Section 190.008(2)(a), *Florida Statutes* ("**Adopted Budget"**), and incorporated herein by reference; provided, however, that the comparative figures contained in the Adopted Budget may be subsequently revised as deemed necessary by the District Manager to reflect actual revenues and expenditures.
- c. The Adopted Budget, as amended, shall be maintained in the office of the District Manager and at the District's Local Records Office and identified as "The Budget for the Southern Hills Plantation I Community Development District for the Fiscal Year Ending September 30, 2025."
- d. The Adopted Budget shall be posted by the District Manager on the District's official website within thirty (30) days after adoption, and shall remain on the website for at least 2 years.

#### SECTION 2. APPROPRIATIONS

There is hereby appropriated out of the revenues of the District, for Fiscal Year 2024/2025, the sum of \$1,334,052 to be raised by the levy of assessments and/or otherwise, which sum is deemed by the Board to be necessary to defray all expenditures of the District during said budget year, to be divided and appropriated in the following fashion:

#### **SECTION 3. BUDGET AMENDMENTS**

Pursuant to Section 189.016, *Florida Statutes*, the District at any time within Fiscal Year 2024/2025 or within 60 days following the end of the Fiscal Year 2024/2025 may amend its Adopted Budget for that fiscal year as follows:

- a. A line-item appropriation for expenditures within a fund may be decreased or increased by motion of the Board recorded in the minutes, and approving the expenditure, if the total appropriations of the fund do not increase.
- b. The District Manager or Treasurer may approve an expenditure that would increase or decrease a line-item appropriation for expenditures within a fund if the total appropriations of the fund do not increase and if either (i) the aggregate change in the original appropriation item does not exceed the greater of \$15,000

- or 15% of the original appropriation, or (ii) such expenditure is authorized by separate disbursement or spending resolution.
- c. Any other budget amendments shall be adopted by resolution and consistent with Florida law.

The District Manager or Treasurer must establish that any amendments to the budget under paragraph c. above are posted on the District's website within 5 days after adoption and remain on the website for at least 2 years.

**SECTION 4. EFFECTIVE DATE.** This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon adoption.

#### **RESOLUTION 2024-08**

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE SOUTHERN HILLS PLANTATION I COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT MAKING A DETERMINATION OF BENEFIT AND IMPOSING SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS FOR FISCAL YEAR 2025; PROVIDING FOR THE COLLECTION AND ENFORCEMENT OF SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS, INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO PENALTIES AND INTEREST THEREON; CERTIFYING AN ASSESSMENT ROLL; PROVIDING FOR AMENDMENTS TO THE ASSESSMENT ROLL; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the Southern Hills Plantation I Community Development District ("District") is a local unit of special-purpose government established pursuant to Chapter 190, Florida Statutes, for the purpose of providing, operating and maintaining infrastructure improvements, facilities and services to the lands within the District; and

**WHEREAS,** the District is located in the City of Brooksville, Hernando County, Florida ("County"); and

**WHEREAS,** the District has constructed or acquired various infrastructure improvements and provides certain services in accordance with the District's adopted capital improvement plan and Chapter 190, Florida Statutes; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors ("Board") of the District hereby determines to undertake various operations and maintenance and other activities described in the District's budget ("Adopted Budget") for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2024 and ending September 30, 2025 ("Fiscal Year 2025"), attached hereto as Exhibit A; and

WHEREAS, the District must obtain sufficient funds to provide for the operation and maintenance of the services and facilities provided by the District as described in the Adopted Budget; and

**WHEREAS,** the provision of such services, facilities, and operations is a benefit to lands within the District; and

**WHEREAS,** Chapter 190, Florida Statutes, provides that the District may impose special assessments on benefitted lands within the District; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interests of the District to proceed with the imposition of the special assessments for operations and maintenance in the amount set forth in the Adopted Budget; and

**WHEREAS,** the District has previously levied an assessment for debt service, which the District desires to collect for Fiscal Year 2025; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 197, Florida Statutes, provides a mechanism pursuant to which such special assessments may be placed on the tax roll and collected by the local tax collector ("Uniform Method"), and the District has previously authorized the use of the Uniform Method by, among other things, entering into agreements with the Property Appraiser and Tax Collector of the County for that purpose; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interests of the District to adopt the assessment roll ("Assessment Roll") attached to this Resolution as Exhibit B, and to certify the portion of the Assessment Roll related to certain property ("Tax Roll Property") to the County Tax Collector pursuant to the Uniform Method and to directly collect the portion of the Assessment Roll relating to certain property for the debt service special assessments ("Direct Collect Property"), all as set forth in Exhibit B; and

**WHEREAS,** it is in the best interests of the District to permit the District Manager to amend the Assessment Roll adopted herein, including that portion certified to the County Tax Collector by this Resolution, as the Property Appraiser updates the property roll for the County, for such time as authorized by Florida law.

#### NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE SOUTHERN HILLS PLANTATION I COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT:

**SECTION 1. BENEFIT & ALLOCATION FINDINGS.** The provision of the services, facilities, and operations as described in **Exhibit A** confers a special and peculiar benefit to the lands within the District, which benefit exceeds or equals the cost of the assessments. The allocation of the assessments to the specially benefitted lands is shown in **Exhibits A and B** and is hereby found to be fair and reasonable.

**SECTION 2. ASSESSMENT IMPOSITION.** Pursuant to Chapters 170, 190 and 197, Florida Statutes, and using the procedures authorized by Florida law for the levy and collection of special assessments, a special assessment for operation and maintenance is hereby imposed and levied on benefitted lands within the District and in accordance with **Exhibits A and B**. The lien of the special assessments for operations and maintenance imposed and levied by this Resolution shall be effective upon passage of this Resolution. Moreover, pursuant to Section 197.3632(4), Florida Statutes, the lien amount shall serve as the "maximum rate" authorized by law for operation and maintenance assessments.

#### SECTION 3. COLLECTION AND ENFORCEMENT; PENALTIES; INTEREST.

A. **Tax Roll Assessments.** The operations and maintenance special assessments and previously levied debt service special assessments imposed on the Tax Roll Property shall be collected at the same time and in the same manner as County taxes in accordance with the Uniform Method, as set forth in **Exhibits A and B**.

- B. Direct Bill Assessments. The previously levied debt service special assessments imposed on the Direct Collect Property shall be collected directly by the District in accordance with Florida law, as set forth in Exhibits A and B. Assessments directly collected by the District are due in full on December 1, 2024; provided, however, that, to the extent permitted by law, the assessments due may be paid in several partial, deferred payments and according to the following schedule: 50% due no later than October 1, 2024, 25% due no later than February 1, 2025, and 25% due no later than April 1, 2025. In the event that an assessment payment is not made in accordance with the schedule stated above, the whole assessment - including any remaining partial, deferred payments for Fiscal Year 2025, shall immediately become due and payable; shall accrue interest, penalties in the amount of one percent (1%) per month, and all costs of collection and enforcement; and shall either be enforced pursuant to a foreclosure action, or, at the District's sole discretion, collected pursuant to the Uniform Method on a future tax bill, which amount may include penalties, interest, and costs of collection and enforcement. Any prejudgment interest on delinquent assessments shall accrue at the rate of any bonds secured by the assessments, or at the statutory prejudgment interest rate, as applicable. In the event an assessment subject to direct collection by the District shall be delinquent, the District Manager and District Counsel, without further authorization by the Board, may initiate foreclosure proceedings pursuant to Chapter 170, Florida Statutes, or other applicable law to collect and enforce the whole assessment, as set forth herein.
- C. **Future Collection Methods.** The decision to collect special assessments by any particular method e.g., on the tax roll or by direct bill does not mean that such method will be used to collect special assessments in future years, and the District reserves the right in its sole discretion to select collection methods in any given year, regardless of past practices.

**SECTION 4. ASSESSMENT ROLL.** The Assessment Roll, attached to this Resolution as **Exhibit B,** is hereby certified for collection. That portion of the Assessment Roll which includes the Tax Roll Property is hereby certified to the County Tax Collector and shall be collected by the County Tax Collector in the same manner and time as County taxes. The proceeds therefrom shall be paid to the District.

**SECTION 5. ASSESSMENT ROLL AMENDMENT.** The District Manager shall keep apprised of all updates made to the County property roll by the Property Appraiser after the date of this Resolution and shall amend the Assessment Roll in accordance with any such updates, for such time as authorized by Florida law, to the County property roll. After any amendment of the Assessment Roll, the District Manager shall file the updates in the District records.

**SECTION 6. SEVERABILITY.** The invalidity or unenforceability of any one or more provisions of this Resolution shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the remaining portions of this Resolution, or any part thereof.

**SECTION 7. EFFECTIVE DATE.** This Resolution shall take effect upon the passage and adoption of this Resolution by the Board.

### FIFTH ORDER OF BUSINESS

Update/Discussion/Consideration: Steadfast Environmental, LLC Items

### A. Waterway Inspection Report - July 2024

Mr. McCoskrie stated that the Clubhouse will be closed next month for golf course aerification so it will be necessary to secure another location for the August meeting. Mr. Adams will secure a room at the sales center as a first option.

Mr. McCoskrie stated he reviewed the Waterway Inspection Report and noted the ponds with recurring algae blooms and a few ponds that were mis-labeled.

Discussion ensued regarding the inspection report, the reason some of the ponds are unhealthy, how best to resolve the algae problems, the littoral shelf, restocking the ponds with carp, the City, golf course wells, reverting back to utilizing copper sulfate to treat the ponds, a \$28,000 proposal to pull vegetation from Lake 8A-A that was tabled, scheduling a workshop to discuss the ponds and inviting aquatics experts to the next meeting.

Ms. Bloomquist opined that the CDD is fighting a losing battle with nature.

Mr. McCoskrie recalled evaluating pond samples; the samples that looked the best, from a chemical standpoint, were the worst looking ponds and the samples that looked the worst, from a chemical standpoint, were the best-looking ponds in the community.

Mr. McCoskrie will contact and invite representatives from the City to the next meeting.

### **SIXTH ORDER OF BUSINESS**

Continued Review/Discussion: Proposed Fiscal Year 2025 Budget

Mr. McCoskrie stated he reviewed the proposed Fiscal Year 2025 budget and minutes from the last meeting and voiced his opinion that the interest income is still not reflected and a few adjustments must be made in the expenditures. Mr. Adams stated adjustments were made to the budget at the last meeting and, since then, Accounting updated the pre-payments and not use the updated version. He noted the following changes that were made at the last meeting:

- Added \$20,000 to "Interest and miscellaneous"
- 76 Increased "Lake/pond bank maintenance" from \$20,000 to \$45,000
- 77 Reduced surplus fund down to \$46,900

78 Mr. Adams stated that the assessment for the 80' lots should be \$280.93 instead of 79 \$297.

Discussion ensued regarding the surplus fund balance amount against the annual budget, errors in the "Unplatted Units Off-Roll", the single-family 80' assessments for Fiscal Year 2024 and projected for Fiscal Year 2025, keeping assessments flat and stabilizing the budget.

Per Mr. McCoskrie, Mr. Adams will adjust the budget to include the changes from the last meeting.

### Acceptance of Unaudited Financial Statements as of May 31, 2024

This item, previously the Eighth Order of Business, was presented out of order.

Asked if CDD II made the \$20,000 payment, Mr. Adams replied no.

Mr. McCoskrie recalled that the Board previously agreed to send a letter and charge interest if the funds were not received by the end of June. Mr. Adams will verify with Accounting and, if the funds were not received, he will draft and send a letter with a revised bill, including interest as of a specific date.

Discussion ensued regarding principal and interest payments that were due on May 1, 2024, the Trustee and bondholder, the amounts in the Bank United ICS and money market accounts, the amount in the Wells Fargo account and the cash balances.

Mr. Adams will contact Bank United and have them shift \$45,000 from the money market to the ICS account.

On MOTION by Mr. McCoskrie and seconded by Mr. Pakan, with all in favor, the Unaudited Financial Statements as of May 31, 2024, were accepted.

### SEVENTH ORDER OF BUSINESS

- As far as the CDD's role in the debt assessment collections, the Operation & Maintenance (O&M) collections that secure the budget are absolutely under the control of the CDD. However, for the debt assessment, the CDD serves as a collection agent for the bondholders.
  - The CDD was asked to certify for collection the last 10 installments of debt; not to certify for collection past due installments from the last four years when the County owned the property or when tax certificates did not sell. The CDD was asked to certify the last 10 years of those installments.
  - Regarding whether this will change the budget, Ms. Kilinski stated the assessment roll, produced by District Management's office, will have a debt installment, so the on-roll assessment amounts in the assessment schedule will show the debt that would be due for the last ten years.
  - Staff has asked them to provide coverage for the CDD for which they have not consented. This is not a clear law in Florida; it is uncommon, unprecedented and is a bit of a grey area. However, the CDD is the collection agent and has documents in the Trust Indenture that state that it takes direction from the bondholders; the funds do not belong to the CDD and, if the bondholders are requesting the CDD to certify lots for collection, it should comply, especially since there is no financial impact to the CDD.
  - Ms. Kilinski recommended that the CDD certify the assessments on an ongoing basis for collection and not take an adverse position to the bondholder. She asked if mailed and published notices explaining the situation should be sent to the 48 lot owners in advance of the budget public hearing in August.

The Board and Staff discussed the Trustee's direction to certify the collection of installments for the 48 lots, why the lots were not re-assessed in 2021, the grey area, the creation of a new Amortization Schedule, the County, a breakdown of the True-up, accessing the reserve account, debt assessment data in the purchase and sales agreements, non-ad valorem assessments, language in the Trust Indenture and the Florida Statutes regarding recertifying assessments. The consensus was that a letter is helpful and Staff should draft and send mailed notices to the 48 lot owners. Per Ms. Kilinski's request, Mr. Pakan will coordinate with District Counsel's office regarding the letter.

### **MEMORANDUM**

Re: Section 189.0694, Florida Statutes (Performance Measures and Standards Reporting)

The purpose of this memorandum is to provide you with additional information regarding new performance measures and standards reporting requirements for special districts. This new requirement was enacted during Florida's 2024 Legislative Session and was originally reported in our legislative newsletters. It has been codified as Section 189.0694, *Florida Statutes*, effective July 1, 2024.

### What is required?

The new statute requires special districts (including community development districts) to establish goals and objectives for its programs and activities and performance measures and standards to determine if its goals and objectives have been achieved. The goals, objectives, and performance measures and standards must be established by **October 1, 2024**, or by the end of the first full fiscal year after a District's creation, whichever is later.

The new statute also requires annual reporting each **December 1** (beginning December 1, 2025) on whether the goals and objectives were achieved, which goals or objectives were not achieved, and what measures were used to make the determination.

### Are there any mandated goals, objectives, or performance measures/standards?

No. The new statute allows a great deal of flexibility for special districts to adopt the goals, objectives, and performance measures and standards that fit their needs. It is likely that many special districts with similar activities and programs may adopt similar measures, but special districts may also add specialized measures if they wish. Attached is a potential starting point for development of these goals, objectives and performance measures/standards in **Attachment A**. ### Text of the Bill: 189.0694 Special districts; performance measures and standards.

- (1) Beginning October 1, 2024, or by the end of the first full fiscal year after its creation, whichever is later, each special district must establish goals and objectives for each program and activity undertaken by the district, as well as performance measures and standards to determine if the district's goals and objectives are being achieved.
- (2) By December 1 of each year thereafter, each special district must publish an annual report on the district's website describing:
  - (a) The goals and objectives achieved by the district, as well as the performance measures and standards used by the district to make this determination.
  - (b) Any goals or objectives the district failed to achieve.

**Standard:** 100% of meetings were advertised with 7 days' notice per statute by at least two methods (i.e., newspaper, CDD website, electronic communications).
